FROM THE PASTOR'S PORCH

Snow, rain and sleet – we have had them all in February - from storm Charlotte on February 9 and on through the month. We had an easy winter last year, so I guess we shouldn't complain, but we do. At least, I do. We should really be grateful that we will have some snow melt, that our lake and the rivers might be full this year.

Water is essential to life. Water is at the beginning and the end of the Bible. In the first telling of the Creation," the earth was formless" and "a wind from God swept over the face of the waters" (Gen. 1). In the second telling of Creation, "God made the earth and the heavens" and "a stream would rise up from the earth and water the whole face of the ground" (Gen. 2). The last chapter of Revelation begins, "Then an angel showed me the river of the water of life, bright as crystal...on either side of the river is the tree of life" (Rev. 22). Water flows through the stories within the Scriptures and some better known ones are the flood, Moses getting water from the rock, Jonah and the whale, Jesus walking on water, multiple stories of the fishermen, the woman at the well, and Jesus washing the disciples feet.

According to my Concordance there are 163 direct references to water and bodies of water and 21 times the words thirst, thirsts, and thirsty appear. Water used literally or figuratively speaks of birth, rebirth, spiritual life, sustained life, purification and physical cleanliness.

As we continue in Lent, we will put some focus on water in our afternoon program on March 10. I am calling the program "Our Water, Our Life" as we look at water in Columbia, with some extension into the wider world. I hope you will join us. Setting the stage are the lovely photos of water in our "This is God's World" art display in the Parish Hall.

Although we still have vivid pictures in our minds of the damage water can do when part of storms such as Irene, and Sandy, and Charlotte, we know that water – good, clean water- is essential to our lives. We also know that what we do affects the quality of the water we depend on. In our resurrection faith, we can work for change and the preservation of God's great gift.

Come and see what God is doing right here.

The children and I talked about a goat that made one girl's dream come true. Beatrice Biira was featured in a children's book called Beatrice's Goat. Heifer International sent 6 goats to her village and her family received one of the goats. The story:

Beatrice went to college in the States. She graduated from Connecticut College and then got her Master's Degree in public work and now is back in Uganda helping her Country.

One goat can make a difference! Every Christmas I ask my family to make a gift of a goat to Heifer in my name so every child can have the opportunity like Beatrice.

Mission 4/1 Earth links together four significant events — Easter (March 31), Earth Day (April 22), Arbor Day (April 26) and Pentecost (May 19) — for a sustained, aggressive and collective mission opportunity for the entire United Church of Christ. Together, we will inspire and aspire to what we can accomplish as ONE CHURCH.

United Church of Christ congregations, colleges, seminaries, camps and outdoor ministries, and health and human service agencies will join together in a shared mission campaign to:

- Collectively offer more than **ONE MILLION HOURS** of engaged earth care, including clean up, advocacy, education, and behavioral changes that will impact the environment. The hours putting together the "**This Is God's World**" display starting in February, and the March program on conservation will count towards these hours.
- Collectively plant more than **100,000 TREES** locally and globally in partnership with the National Arbor Day Foundation and the UCC's denominational partners around the world. **We hope to plant one or two trees as a community** and hope some of you will plant some on your own.
- Collectively write and send more than **100,000 ADVOCACY LETTERS** on environmental concerns to elected officials and local and national newspapers. We will have a **letter signing campaign on April 21**st.

On Sunday April 28 our worship will be a **Creation Pageant** put on by our Sunday school, teachers, and youth. Come and see.

Your creative ideas to further this mission to live out our faith for the sake of our fragile planet Earth are welcome.

- 1. Ride a bike, carpool or use public transportation instead of driving alone in a car.
- 2. Read a book or watch a documentary about the environment.
- 3. Plant and tend an organic garden all that weeding and watering time adds up quickly!
- 4. Help tend to a community garden.
- 5. Attend an earth-care-focused worship service.
- 6. Write advocacy letters (which counts in time AND in letters sent!).
- 7. Install energy-efficient light bulbs or appliances.
- 8. Attend an Earth Day rally.
- 9. Recycle coffee grounds by putting them on acid loving plants.
- 10. Donate items to thrifts shops and shop there, too.
- 11. Create a compost bin at church and/or your home.
- 12. Turn out lights in rooms you are not in.
- 13. Donate plastic grocery bags to Goodwill, Salvation Army or second hand shops.
- 14.RECYCLE. Time spent collecting, sorting, and submitting recycled materials.
- 15. Check all your faucets to make sure they don't drip.
- 16. Wash clothes in cold water. Count 1 hour per load for the 50 days.
- 17. Read the labels use detergents that don't harm the environment.
- 18. Recycle your old cell phone.
- 19. Ask church members to donate one or more mugs to the church for coffee hour, rather than use paper. Return/recycle empty toner and ink cartridges.
- 20. Vinegar can be used for cleaning.
- 21. Have litter collection days where church members work in teams to pick up trash along roadsides and in parks.
- 22.Learn ways to live green via online eco-blogs.
- 23. Arrange a video discussion night and watch a video addressing issues about our planet.
- 24. Plant a tree in your back yard or give one as a gift.
- 25. Use only organic fertilizer on your lawn this spring.
- 26. Use a manual lawnmower (you'll be cutting down on noise pollution, too)
- 27. Walk to the store, church, school, the park, post office, library any short trips you normally use the car for.

Summer Outdoor Fun

If rainbow-splashed scarves blowing in the California breeze on a hot summer day don't raise a few eyebrows and generate some dialogue, the Rev. Marja Coons-Torn doesn't know what will.

In a colorful, symbolic move to stem the tide of violence — most notably, the recent wave of bullying — Coons-Torn has created the UCC Scarf Project with a goal of crafting 3,000 scarves in time for the United Church of Christ's General Synod 29 next July in Long Beach, Calif.

"The project has spread like wildfire," said Coons-Torn. "It truly has taken on a life of its own. I know of men and women in at least a half-dozen conferences that are already hard at work."

One church off and running with the project is St. John's UCC in Mifflinburg, Pa., where the Rev. Susan Gabbard has a message for those who are bullied: You do not deserve it.

"There are some people who are just so full of hate and insecurities that they look for other people to pick on to make themselves feel better," said the Rev. Susan Gabbard, church pastor. "It's not even about you."

Volunteers have started to knit, crochet and weave their way to creations 4 to 6 inches wide and 60 inches long, says Coons-Torn.

"We learned about the use of scarves by other denominations who were raising awareness about other issues," she said. "The scarves are a bright and visible symbol of the commitment we're asking of people."

Here's the hook:

Scarves of varying patterns — each sporting rainbow colors — are being made to be given to Synod attendees who pledge to commit to acting against violence. "It could be talking with your school superintendent about bullying, volunteering at a women's shelter or writing to your senators," said Coons-Torn of the advocacy possibilities.

"So when someone walks up to you at General Synod and asks you about your scarf, you offer to give it to them if they will agree to take an action against violence," she said. "Then you can return to the display hall and pick out a new scarf."

Andy Lang, executive director of the UCC's Coalition for LGBT Concerns in Cleveland, expressed deep gratitude to Coons-Torn and scarf-makers nationwide "who've taken the initiative to conceive and launch this project."

"General Synod in Long Beach will be a seascape of rainbow colors, and an opportunity to renew our commitment to protect every youth whose life and health are endangered by bullying," said Lang.

While skeins of yarn transform into thousands of scarves, Coons-Torn is also optimistic that the act of compassion will turn into help for victims of violence — including vulnerable LGBT teenagers who increasingly experience teasing, taunting and harassment.
