FROM THE PASTOR'S PORCH

For the first time since the chill of winter set in, the warming sun transformed the porch to a comfortable space to sit, watch traffic, and consider life.

Three years ago the Columbia Congregational Church called me to serve as its settled minister. On that day you stepped out in faith by calling someone just entering the ministry, although with some years of life experience. I stepped out in faith that this lovely faith community in the “quiet corner” is where God wants me to serve. I still believe the covenant we made with one another is good and strong.

Together we have faced a number of challenges. Blizzards, hurricanes and near drought battered our lives. Long term power outages quickly grew old, and patience thinned. News of fires, floods, earthquakes, and tornadoes led to prayers for our neighbors around the world. Many hear/see Earth crying for help and we are overwhelmed with the knowledge of the changes that need to take place, certain that what we do is not enough but also certain that what we do added to the work of others can change the world. The shootings in Newtown and the bombing at the Boston Marathon left us stunned, grieving, and confused. Together we have sought God's presence, comfort, and guidance. Together we have asked, “What is our faith filled response?”

There are no easy answers. We may faithfully stand on opposite sides of issues. However, we are not divided but look to each other's gifts and talents and move forward with hope and joy and with faith in our still- speaking, Creator God who continues to lead us in the way.

Columbia is a wonderful place to live. Our faith community, faithfully facing its challenges, is loving and strong. Although May is a busy month as we participate in church, school and community activities, it is ever important to begin our days and nights in relationship with God. We are strengthened in this relationship by coming together each week to be fed by the Spirit, to be nurtured and refreshed, so we can go back into the worlds in which we live, persevering in faith and reflecting the light of Christ for all to see.

**In Columbia: Art, Education, and Advocacy

In an effort toward environmental awareness, Columbia Congregational Church has been looking at God's world in a number of ways leading up to and including the UCC Mission 4/1 Earth campaign. Some are continuing, some completed others still in the planning stages.

We began, after Ash Wednesday, with the "This Is God's World" art display in our fellowship hall. Installing picture rails between windows on two walls made it possible to display pictures of nature as shown in various art forms by our congregation members. During the Youth Group Rock-A-Thon "all-nighter," our youth made a collage with pictures they found in various magazines. We also have a couple of oil paintings, some needlework, pen and ink, along with many photos, some framed, some not.

Of course most pictures are of beautiful rivers, fields, flora and fauna. Who takes pictures of garbage and polluted waters, the damage done to God's world? However, one photo shows a sea lion with several fish hooks caught in its flesh and there are several photos of some of Katrina damage in Biloxi, MS.

The first pictures went up the day before our first breakfast fundraiser, creating a homey atmosphere, but also, we hope, helping bring awareness to those who attended.

On March 10 we invited two local residents to speak to us about the water in Columbia for a program we called "Our Water. Our Life." Most of the Columbia, if not all, gets its water from wells, and we all enjoy our lovely lake. One speaker is very active in conservation and open space committees and the other serves on the Lake Management Committee. We learned a lot about the importance of our watersheds and our lake not only to us but to our neighboring towns down-stream.

On April 21st after church during our fellowship time, we will be encouraging members to sign Environmental Advocacy Letters. We have received some samples from CT Conference, but may develop some of our own.

On April 28th our children will lead our congregation with a Creation Pageant. Several years ago Lisa Crick of the Middlebury Congregational Church created the pageant based on the Genesis story. Lisa has kindly given us permission to use it.

Still in the planning stages is creating a vegetable garden, using our own composted waste, to raise fresh produce for the soup kitchen, as well as cleaning up the two flower gardens already on church grounds. We also hope to plant a sizeable tree on town open space land as well as raise money to plant trees through the links offered by the UCC.

Our Green Team has been actively encouraging us to recycle, reduce and reuse for several years. Our efforts, though small, continue to evolve as we look at God's World with concern and love and take measures to sustain it for future generations.

"**Mission 4/1 Earth: 50 Great Days**" is about boldly living Jesus' let-your-light-shine proclamation in the Sermon on the Mount: "That they may see your good works!" It is an opportunity to live out our faith — in unity, as one church — for the sake of our fragile planet Earth.

Launching on Easter Monday, April 1, 2013, and continuing through the great 50 days of Eastertide, United Church of Christ congregations, colleges, seminaries, camps and outdoor ministries, and health and human service agencies will join together in a shared mission campaign to:

- Collectively offer more than **ONE MILLION HOURS** of engaged earth care, including clean up, advocacy, education, and behavioral changes that will impact the environment.
- Collectively plant more than **100,000 TREES** locally and globally in partnership with the National Arbor Day Foundation and the UCC's denominational partners around the world.
- Collectively write and send more than **100,000 ADVOCACY LETTERS** on environmental concerns to elected officials and local and national newspapers.

Mission 4/1 Earth links together four significant events — Easter (March 31), Earth Day (April 22), Arbor Day (April 26) and Pentecost (May 19) — for a sustained, aggressive and collective mission opportunity for the entire United Church of Christ. Together, we will inspire and aspire to what we can accomplish as ONE CHURCH.

We are encouraged to engage in creative local mission projects, service opportunities, educational programs, worship services, and media events. Your innovation will spark momentum for the initiative and stir the imaginations of other UCC people, agencies, schools, and congregations.

1. Ride a bike, carpool or use public transportation instead of driving alone in a car.
2. Read a book or watch a documentary about the environment.
3. Plant and tend an organic garden – all that weeding and watering time adds up quickly!
4. Help tend to a community garden.
5. Attend an earth-care-focused worship service.
6. Write advocacy letters (which counts in time AND in letters sent!).
7. Install energy-efficient light bulbs or appliances.
8. Attend an Earth Day rally.
9. Recycle coffee grounds by putting them on acid loving plants.
10. Donate items to thrifts shops and shop there, too.
11. Create a compost bin at church and/or your home.
12. Turn out lights in rooms you are not in.
13. Donate plastic grocery bags to Goodwill, Salvation Army or second hand shops.
14. RECYCLE. Time spent collecting, sorting, and submitting recycled materials.
15. Check all your faucets to make sure they don't drip.
16. Wash clothes in cold water. Count 1 hour per load for the 50 days.
17. Read the labels — use detergents that don't harm the environment.
18. Recycle your old cell phone.
19. Ask church members to donate one or more mugs to the church for coffee hour, rather than use paper. Return/recycle empty toner and ink cartridges.
20. Vinegar can be used for cleaning.
21. Have litter collection days where church members work in teams to pick up trash along roadsides and in parks.
22. Learn ways to live green via online eco-blogs.
23. Arrange a video discussion night and watch a video addressing issues about our planet.
24. Plant a tree in your back yard or give one as a gift.
25. Use only organic fertilizer on your lawn this spring.
26. Use a manual lawnmower (you'll be cutting down on noise pollution, too)
27. Walk to the store, church, school, the park, post office, library – any short trips you normally use the car for.

If rainbow-splashed scarves blowing in the California breeze on a hot summer day don't raise a few eyebrows and generate some dialogue, the Rev. Marja Coons-Torn doesn't know what will.

In a colorful, symbolic move to stem the tide of violence — most notably, the recent wave of bullying — Coons-Torn has created the UCC Scarf Project with a goal of crafting 3,000 scarves in time for the United Church of Christ's General Synod 29 next July in Long Beach, Calif.

"The project has spread like wildfire," said Coons-Torn. "It truly has taken on a life of its own. I know of men and women in at least a half-dozen conferences that are already hard at work."

One church off and running with the project is St. John's UCC in Mifflinburg, Pa., where the Rev. Susan Gabbard has a message for those who are bullied: You do not deserve it.

"There are some people who are just so full of hate and insecurities that they look for other people to pick on to make themselves feel better," said the Rev. Susan Gabbard, church pastor. "It's not even about you."

Volunteers have started to knit, crochet and weave their way to creations 4 to 6 inches wide and 60 inches long, says Coons-Torn.

"We learned about the use of scarves by other denominations who were raising awareness about other issues," she said. "The scarves are a bright and visible symbol of the commitment we're asking of people."

Here's the hook:

Scarves of varying patterns — each sporting rainbow colors — are being made to be given to Synod attendees who pledge to commit to acting against violence. "It could be talking with your school superintendent about bullying, volunteering at a women's shelter or writing to your senators," said Coons-Torn of the advocacy possibilities.

"So when someone walks up to you at General Synod and asks you about your scarf, you offer to give it to them if they will agree to take an action against violence," she said. "Then you can return to the display hall and pick out a new scarf."

Andy Lang, executive director of the UCC's Coalition for LGBT Concerns in Cleveland, expressed deep gratitude to Coons-Torn and scarf-makers nationwide "who've taken the initiative to conceive and launch this project."

"General Synod in Long Beach will be a seascape of rainbow colors, and an opportunity to renew our commitment to protect every youth whose life and health are endangered by bullying," said Lang.

While skeins of yarn transform into thousands of scarves, Coons-Torn is also optimistic that the act of compassion will turn into help for victims of violence — including vulnerable LGBT teenagers who increasingly experience teasing, taunting and harassment.
