## **FROM THE PASTOR'S PORCH**

The snow continues to fall during the "blizzard of 2015" and the wind thrusts the crystals through the screen and onto the porch. The plows on the road growl along as they work. White banks have drifted up against doors and windows. Juncos, sparrows, finches, cardinals, woodpeckers, bluebirds, and even a Carolina wren flutter around the feeders I made sure were full the night before. The junco and nuthatch seem willing to share the suet. A squirrel longingly glances up at the feeder then returns to scavenging the seed dropped by the birds

As I watch this dance of wildlife, I become aware of the interdependence of all creation and how each of us can participate. I make sure the birds are fed, even if it is inconvenient to wade through the snow with the wind blowing cold flakes into my face. And then I enjoy there feasting and observe their interaction.

When we serve one another, we all benefit. We do not help another so we can feel good but out of a desire to provide for another, to live faithfully. There is nothing wrong with feeling good about doing it. What matters is our intention.

Unlike the wild creatures, we humans live behind closed doors, for the most part. When we no longer had a dog to walk through the neighborhood, I found connections with our neighbors began to fade. Everyone drove up their drive and disappeared into their garage, and one assumed into their house. The next time we saw them they were in their car driving down the street, except for those first spring days when everyone seemed to slip from the confinement in their home to soak in the warming sun and fresh air and walk in the knowledge that winter was coming to an end.

The fact is we don't know the needs of our neighbors unless we talk with them. On the one hand, we might assume everything is fine or their family or other friends are helping them. And on the other hand, we may think others should know what we need, when in fact they don't. I would guess everyone is struggling with something. We are often quick to share our joys but more reticent to speak of our aching bodies, our worries about family, our doubts in faith, and other life challenges that all contribute to our isolation.

Like the finches that drop the seed for the juncos, or the nuthatch and the junco who share the same suet, we need to find ways to help one another, reach out even when not beckoned, show we care and share our gifts. We also need to communicate our own needs. That can be very difficult for us independent New Englanders. I am not saying we need to know or reveal all the intimate details of our lives. I am saying, we need to let people know we care whether we know those details or not.

When you come to church, look around and see who is missing, who haven't you seen in a while? Write an encouragement card to them. And / or write a reminder card to yourself to give them a call later in the week. Let them know they are missed and you are concerned about them. You are thinking of them and wanted to say "hello." You could, if the opportunity arises, ask if you can do anything to help. Do they need some groceries brought in or a ride somewhere? Could they use a visit? Visitation is not only the responsibility of the pastor, but also the entire congregation. It is what builds and sustains community. It is putting one's Christian faith into practice.

I am hoping that during this blizzard you have called neighbors, friends, folks you think might be challenged because of the weather, as well as your family, to check to see if they are OK and let them know that you are thinking of them. Together we reflect the light of Christ and show God's love.

## ASH WEDNESDAY

Ash Wednesday will be observed on **February 18th** with a worship service that includes communion by intinction and an opportunity to light a candle as an expression of a desire for healing.

Ash Wednesday begins the period of Lent, the 40 days before Easter (not counting Sundays) when Christians engage in spiritual disciplines involving repentance, fasting, prayer, study and works of love. We see an allusion to Jesus' 40 days of fasting and prayer in the desert after his baptism by John as well as to Moses' 40 days of fasting and prayer in response to the people making the Golden Calf to worship.

After the 7<sup>th</sup> century this service was widely used and included, then, an imposition of ashes. Ashes were used in ancient times to express [mourning](#). Dusting oneself with ashes was the penitent's way of expressing sorrow for sin. This practice is continued by some churches.

The day in general, and our service more specifically, is a time for contemplating and repenting our transgressions, acknowledging life's transience, and recognizing God's gift of Jesus Christ through whom we are forgiven. Through the sacrament of the Lord's Supper we are brought back into communion with the Holy and those who have gone before.

## **Lenten Activity 2015**

### **Our Western Wall**

Lent is a time for reflection, confession and seeking redemption. It is a time of thinking about who we are, of our link to Christians around the world, or our small role in the great expanse of the universe and to remember to whom we belong and consider who we have been called to be.

**Look for the Prayer Wall** that will be going up on the Parish Hall Altar. In line with the Western Wall in Jerusalem, this will be a place where you can bring your prayers to God. You can write your prayer at home, during Joys and Concerns, or on the paper that will be provided at the wall, and then roll it up and place it in the wall.

The invitation is open to everyone: children and adults. This is an intergenerational activity.

While I cannot promise the prayers will not be read by others, the Parish Hall is a very public place, it is hoped that all will respect the privacy of these prayers.

At the end of Lent, the prayers will be burned, the smoke carrying the prayers into God's eternal care.
