

Friends in Christ,

This month the Christian church enters the holy season of Lent. This period of forty days is a reminder of the forty day fasting times of Moses when he received the Ten Commandments (Exodus 34:27-28); Elijah fleeing into the wilderness for forty days (1 Kings 19:1-18) and, most importantly the time when Jesus withdrew into the desert to fast for forty days in preparation for the beginning of his public ministry (Luke 4:1-2). It is also a time that follows the life of Jesus as he moves to his death on the Cross and then the miracle of His resurrection on Easter. Lent is the traditional preparatory time that calls Christians to introspection and sacrifice in order to move closer to Jesus' Way.

The sacrifices made during Lent often arise from some poor habits that we feel need addressing or, we may choose to give up something that we really enjoy. Both are noble thoughts, however, Lent really isn't about giving up bonbons for 40 days. A true move onto a Lenten journey with the Christ might better seek to prayerfully let go of the baggage that keeps us separated from the Savior. Very often that baggage is filled with old hurts and unresolved grudges. Should we choose instead a forgiving attitude, it will take us a long way towards the reconciliation and the newness of life promised by the empty tomb on Easter.

When I first entered ministry, Rev. Bruce Bunker, my pastor and mentor in Wallingford, offered me some sage ministerial advice that I've never forgotten. He said to me, "Whenever someone comes into your office, listen closely for their need for forgiveness or their desire to forgive others." Over many years, I've come to appreciate the importance of that statement. The unresolved wrong is often the most painful wound we carry with us. Forgiveness, whether towards others or ourselves, is not easily accomplished and frequently holds us back from enjoying life fully. To be sure, forgiveness is often the most difficult of the spiritual practices.

To forgive others, including persons who don't feel remorsefulness or may not even be alive, requires facing our pain and freeing ourselves from its hold and accepting that it may always be a one-sided release. It is however a positive move toward resolving those past hurts that goes a long way toward renewing and strengthening our faith and brings us closer to the Almighty.

Our society speaks all-too-often to retribution. Politicians, movies, television, news stories and more all seem to point to vengeance as the natural order of life. To follow in the Way of Jesus is to take a totally different direction. To offer mercy, and a reprieve from the past is the beginning of a renewed life and demonstrates the presence of healing amidst the brokenness of the world.

Spiritual writer, Frederick Buechner, offers this thought, "When you forgive somebody who has wronged you, you are spared the dismal corrosion and wounded pride. For both parties, forgiveness means the freedom again to be at peace inside their own skins and to be glad in each other's presence."

At times forgiveness can seem a bitter pill to swallow, but once accomplished it can prove much sweeter than the most delicious candy--- and a huge step forward on the path of your Lenten journey. Along that pathway, we'll make a stop at a Cross where the crucified Master said "God forgive them for they know not what they do." That unmerited love for each of us is the grounding that leads us to be Resurrection People for others. May it be so.
