

#### ECHOES FROM THE ARCHIVES"...

The Ladie's Missionary Society

Except for those Sunday School, which began in 1720- (see Newsletter-May 1990), the Ladies Missionary Society was the oldest of the Church organizations which were formed in, the 1800's.

The original record book consists of eleven sheets of ruled paper sewed together in a simple cover of heavier material. Each year's record uses a single page, giving only the date of the annual meeting, the officers, and the names of the collectors with the amounts obtained in their (then) six school districts of the town.

The amount of \$21.75 was the total for the first year-a very impressive sum for that era when farming was the principle means of livelihood and a dollar was far more significant amount than it is today.

The annual "Missionary Teas" were social events of the summers during the early decades of the 1900's. The programs featured a talk by the missionary (usually one recently returned from foreign service) and an offering which was combined with the ladies' mite boxes which had replaced the district collections as a means of fund raising. Following the programs, which were held in the chapel, refreshments of iced tea (a tradition for the occasions) and sandwiches and cookies were served.

The Columbia society had in 1885 become an auxiliary of the Hartford Branch of the Women's Board of Missions. However, within a few decades it was becoming apparent that other means of financing the church's missionary support were more efficient; and in 1935 the Ladies Missionary Society voted to disband and merge with Ladies Aid.


