ECHOES FROM THE ARCHIVES”...

“The 150th Anniversary”

The Church’s 150th Anniversary was celebrated on October 24, 1866- that year marking a century and a half since the organization of the Ecclesiastical Society. The choice of October was of no significance other than the fact that definite plans for the observance had not formally begun until late June.

The year 1720, when the first minister, Reverend Samuel Smith was called to the parish and ordained here, is now recognized as the actual establishment of the church. Other significant anniversaries of this were observed in 1920 and 1970.

By a vote of the church, “Exercises of the Celebration” were published in a 96-page book which, in addition to the complete account of the programs, contains excellent summaries of many aspects of church history which had been unresearched and written for the occasion.

Both the morning and afternoon programs consisted of poems, “remarks” and “addresses”, and reading of the historical papers as well as prayers and music.

At noontime, a repast which today would be called a pot-luck dinner but was dignified by the term “collation” in the published report, was “...dispensed at the Town Hall owing to the lateness of the season...” (That town hall was the original one which was built in 1855 just north of the Old Yard Cemetery.)

It is interesting that the Collation Committee consisted originally of six men who “...at one of their meetings appointed a sub-committee of two more men and twelve women to assist them”.

The report of the “Collation” continues: “...the good things flowed in until all the space appointed to that purpose was filled to over flowing so that the committee was enabled to make a ‘Bill of Fare’ consisting of the following:

Cold Tongue, Baked Lamb (stuffed), Sandwiches, Wheat Bread, Fruit Cake, Silver Cake, Cookies, Apple Pie, Cream Pie, Apples, Sliced Beef, Ham, Cold Chicken, Biscuit, Loaf Cake, Gold Cake, Cup Cakes, Fried Cakes, Mince Pie, Corn Starch Pie, Baked Apples, Coffee...”

“The fragments remaining were distributed among the needy; thereby filling their hearts with thankfulness that it was put into the minds of the people to celebrate the formation of the Church in Columbia.”
